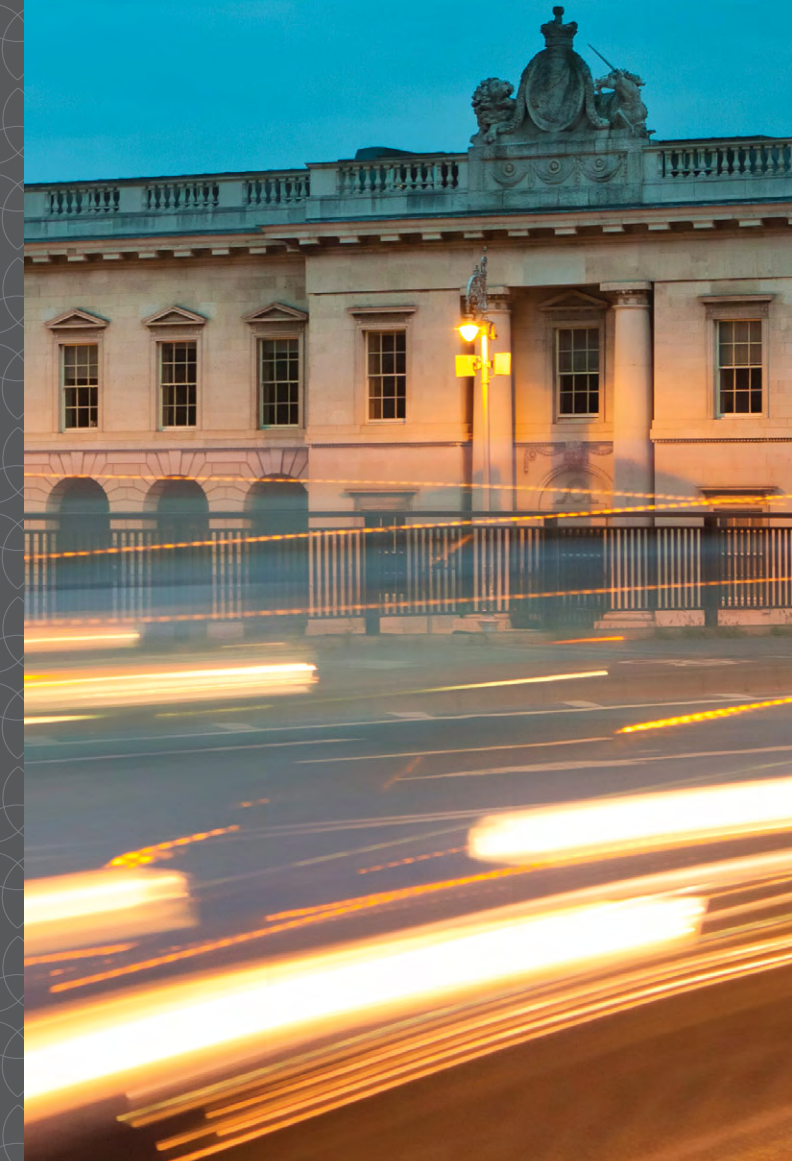

This exciting 5.5-week summer program in Dublin offers you the opportunity to gain an understanding of Ireland across a broad spectrum of study and experience.

The two courses incorporate elements of Irish history, literature, politics, culture and society, with co-curricular field excursions to Northern Ireland and Cork to contextualize and deepen the experience. All students will take both courses, and the co-curricular excursions are compulsory.



Visit Belfast in Northern Ireland for lessons in Irish politics and history, and Cork for a summer literary festival.

Irish History, Literature & Politics

This course aims to equip students with a basic knowledge of the primary historical and cultural factors that have contributed to the development of contemporary Irish socio/cultural identity.

The course has 3 modules:

- » Irish History
- » Anglo-Irish Literature
- » The Political Landscape of Ireland

The Irish History segment is designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the broad sweep of Irish history from the earliest Stone Age inhabitants right up to the “Celtic Tiger” and economic boom of the early 21st century.

An introduction to Anglo-Irish literature will familiarize you with literary, social and cultural factors that led to the development of a body of literature that is of great importance in both national and world contexts. You’ll explore writings from Irish authors such as W. B. Yeats, J. M. Synge and James Joyce.

The Political Landscape of Ireland introduces students to both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland. It examines

the contemporary political landscape by exploring topics such as political culture, the constitution, political parties, elections and the electoral system, and Ireland’s position in the European Union.

Irish Culture & Society

In this course you will come to understand the contemporary cultural landscape in Ireland. The main objective is to critically examine current Irish cultural and societal preoccupations and to emphasize the relationship between culture, media and the formation of national identity. You’ll learn about the influences that have shaped the dominant socio-cultural system in today’s Ireland.

The course has 3 modules:

- » Irish Culture and Society
- » Economics
- » Peace and Conflict Resolution

One of the key areas the course will address is Ireland’s status as a post-colonial nation. You’ll explore social and cultural geographies, including: decolonization and the construction of identity, division and conflict, effects of globalization and the incorporation of multiple identities within present day Ireland. The peace process in Ireland will serve as a case study.

» Northern Ireland Excursion

During a field excursion to Northern Ireland, students will visit Stormont Buildings, The Northern Ireland Legislative Assembly, An Culturainn (Irish Language Revival Center, Belfast) and participate in The Murals Tour.

» West Cork Literary Festival

Students will visit Bantry, Co. Cork where they will experience literary workshops and readings and be able to integrate the trip into their academic curriculum.
