




#### **INDUSTRY**

Attire may be more formal some days or every day. You may need at least one full suit (and tie for gents), but nice slacks/skirt with a collared shirt are also sufficient.




Arts, marketing, communications, charities: Expect business casual.



#### **COMFORT & CONFIDENCE**

When you feel comfortable and have confidence in what you are wearing, it is reflected in your attitude and performance. When packing, consider what looks flattering on you and what is appropriate for the work you will be doing. Obviously, working at a desk versus working in a theatre versus working with children would all require different selections.






You must bring at least one or two business formal outfit for your first week regardless of work sector.

Sweaters plus a light rain jacket and a coat


